

- 90% of your child's brain growth happens before the age of 5.
- In the first 5 years of your child's life their brain develops faster than at any other time
- We play a significant role in encouraging and supporting children's brain development
- The early years are the best opportunity for a child's brain to develop the connections they need to be healthy, capable, successful adults.
- We talk to the children about "growing our brains"









- Red sweatshirt or cardigan (with or without school logo)
 White polo shirt (with or without school logo)
- Grey bottoms (jogging bottoms or leggings)
- Red book bag
- Please make sure children can do the fastenings by themselves
- A water bottle clearly labelled with your child's name. (Water only no juice)









- Each child is different but the majority settle quickly some may need a slower transition and this will be agreed with Ms Szabo
- Some children may cry but please be reassured they usually stop quickly and move on way before you have!
- <u>Good attendance is necessary in order for children to settle and grow at Nursery</u>








What can you do now to support your child starting Nursery



- Get your child used to other people Ask family and friends to help
- Make the most of their developing language skills and chat to them about starting Nursery
- Read books There are lots of picture books about starting nursery, which can help your child get a better understanding of it. There are also CBeebies programmes about starting Nursery
- Develop your child's independence using the toilet, eating fruit, putting on shoes
